Three large inflatable tents at Waipahu Cultural Garden Park make up the first mobile homeless center on Oahu. The pilot program is called the Homeless Outreach and Navigation for Unsheltered Persons project, or HONU. At the site, social service agencies will work with homeless individuals and families to try to quickly move them into more permanent housing. The 3year HONU project

is budgeted to cost \$6 million and will come from the \$30 million in Ohana Zone funding previously approved by state legislators. Most of the money (\$5 million) will be spent on staffing, including an increased HPD presence in the HONU. The other \$1 million will be spent on hardware, including the inflatable, water-resistant, wind-resistant structures. After the 90-day period ends in Waipahu, the goal is to set up a second HONU in the spring in another city park somewhere in the urban core.

Ukulele Lending Program



Ukulele virtuoso Jake Shimabukuro performed at the Waipahu Public Library to introduce the new ukulele lending program at the library. Library patrons can now borrow a ukulele for 3 weeks with a library card. The 'ukulele are provided by the Music for Life Foundation and Jake Shimabukuro, codirector of the 'ukulele sponsorship, with the goal of making 'ukulele and 'ukulele playing opportunities accessible to all by allowing them to be checked out as easily as books. We are lucky to have this program in our community.
